President's Report 2022/2023

As we celebrate another season of outstanding achievements, I am proud to present the annual report to members of the Seacliff SLSC and the broader community, including sponsors and supporters.

Patrolling the beach is our core business and committing the time to patrolling Seacliff beach and providing water cover at the many other events Seacliff supports (including the BJC, Atlantis swims and carnival water cover), is very much appreciated. Hayley took on the role of Vice Captain Patrols and did an outstanding job with the rostering, communication and ongoing support of the patrol team, well assisted by some of our experienced and enthusiastic patrol captains.

I also extend that thanks to all the members, sponsors and stakeholders for the continued engagement of Seacliff SLSC in the many diverse ways that people contribute to the various areas around the club and activities.

The opportunity to provide some information and reassure our members, particularly to our juniors, was well received and well organised, thanks to Derek and Matt with the support of the AGLs and coaches. Thanks to the support of the SLSSA team and other members in managing the incident.

In the Bistro Tara and Jenna stepped up and with the support of Suzie, the Business Liaison Officer and Gareth from a financial perspective as well as the staff, the Bistro has been running well. It was a great summer with many Friday nights booked out and the addition of the DJ certainly added to the atmosphere. We also brought back the Friday night meat raffle which was very well received and is a great opportunity to talk to the community about the work being done at Seacliff SLSC. 


Teenage Surf Life Saver, **Hayley Hosking**, was named *Young Citizen of* the Year for being a role model for young and female Surf Life Savers.

Joining the Seacliff Surf Life Saving Club when she was a child, the 19year-old has progressed to become Vice-Captain of Patrols and volunteered more than 400 hours on Patrol in the 2021/22 Summer season.

In 2022, she was named Youth Life Saver of the Year at the Surf Life Saving Australia National Awards of Excellence.

"A champion for inclusion, Hayley is a key member of Seacliff's 'Beach for All' subcommittee that assists members of the public, who may have physical or mental conditions, gain access to the beach on a beach mat or water wheelchairs," Mayor Wilson said before Hayley received her award.







Hall of Fame

In October 2022, at the Adelaide Oval Magarey Room, Seacliff SLSC Life Member (2007), **Dwayne Thuys**, was inducted into the Sports SA Hall of Fame.




Dwayne joined Seacliff as Nipper in 1968/69 and obtained the Bronze

Medallion in 1978. He was an inaugural member of the SLSSA Hall of Fame in 2016. Between 1981 and 1989, Dwayne won 9 consecutive SA Iron Man titles, and in 2005, competing for our Club's 75th year anniversary at 52 years of age, won Silver in the Iron Man.

In Open competion at the Australian Surf Life Saving Titles, Dwayne has won 14 medals, as 5 Gold, 5 Silver and 4 Bronze. His pinnacle came in 1985-6 when he won back-to-back Iron Man Gold medals at Point Leo, Victoria and Moana. This was after winning the 1984 World Championship Iron Man title in Hawaii. Dwayne states that besides the two Iron Man titles, his third proudest achievements was his only win in a round of the Uncle Toby's Series in howling wind and surf at Goolwa in 1997 at 34 years.

From 1984-87, Dwayne was in the Australian Representative Team competing in New Zealand, Hawaii and Australia. In 2006, Dwayne competed in the World Masters Championships in Lorne Beach, Victoria taking home two Gold medals and one Silver medal. Internationally recognised as an amazing surf athlete, we congratulate Dwayne, as the first Lifesaver, on his elevation, into the Sports SA, Hall of Fame.


Secretary Report 2022/2023

Working with Children Checks and National Police Clearances

This season 91% of our members over the age of 14 had a current wwcc listed in SurfGuard. Surf Race Report - 2022/2023

We had an ambitious goal to run 23 Surf Races this season – the schedule meant that we were well on target, had it not been for a stormy day one week, and a pesky shark hanging around another week ... Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve falling on consecutive Saturdays gave us a unique opportunity to run a couple of very special events, which were splendidly supported & resulted in memorable occasions.





Once again, the 'check in & check out' system that we implemented during Covid was continued this season. This has been invaluable as it has enabled us to know at all times who is participating, and who is still in the water at the finish. This comes in really handy if we have an instance where swimmers have not 'checked out', and we are able to pinpoint who we are looking for.

The number of swimmers were high again this season with a total of 172 swimmers hitting the water. The largest category by far

were the Juniors with 64, the next being the Over 40's, a fair way down with 28. It was once again great however, to see the Over 60's category being hotly contested between 11 very competitive swimmers.

Consequently, the actual number of swimmers participating in the Surf Race each week were very respectable, with the Christmas Half Mile attracting 85 competitors – the second Half Mile had 62, and several standard 400 metre events recorded 70 or more. The Mile didn't break any participation records, but a good number of 52 swimmers hit the water recording some great times.

The majority of categories had the trophy being awarded to clear winners, but several (Over 30's, Over 60's, Open Female, Under 15's and the Juniors) were winners that were separated by the points on offer in a single swim. Similar to those who have taken trophies home in the past, success is all about consistency ... just turn up every week and give it all you've got.

Speaking of turning up and swimming as many Surf Races as you possibly can, our Club Constitution clearly dictates your eligibility if you are gunning for one of the desirable trophies offered in the Mile (first across the line, fastest corrected time, youngest swimmer, oldest swimmer). To summarise, you need to swim 3 x 400m and 1 x 800m Surf Races throughout the season to be eligible. It's really disappointing to see someone not awarded a trophy just because they weren't eligible, so make sure you do the swims if you want to put yourself in the running.



I would like to personally thank Nita & Greg Natt for their invaluable support throughout the season. It wouldn't be possible to run this event week in week out without their assistance. Also thanks to Paul Davies, Kathryn & Paul Bastiaans, and Emma & Christopher Webb who provided vital assistance when required. Also, many thanks to Cliff Joseph and Barry Doughty who alternately shared the position at the northern end of the beach with stopwatch in hand, making sure that all swimmers have their correct time.

The weekly Surf Race is unique where it is one of a few, if not the only, Club event where every active member can compete next to each other in a friendly, good-natured manner. Finally, thanks to every swimmer who took to the water this season. Your sportsperson like behaviour and encouraging nature towards your fellow swimmers, personally makes this weekly event a pleasure.

Competition Report 2022/2023

Season 2022/2023 continued to show the strength and depth of Surf sports competitors within Seacliff SLSC! It was a season where normality resumed, with full carnivals and a busy summer schedule which had be condensed into a shorter season given The Australian Surf Life Saving Championships occurring



at the end of March. Once again, we had a large number of Youth, Senior and Master competitors that dominated in competition. across a range of disciplines from boat carnivals, board and ski carnivals, beach. Surf league, IRBs, Pool Rescue competition and the Kozzi Enduro, not to mention interstate carnivals in NSW and Queensland.

This year saw some changes to the scoring; with the removal of the 1 to 6 points across all events with the overall Championship club being decided on gold medals, and only points for top 3 placings. We carried our amazing Club success forward again from our last season by winning the Senior Champion club flag (back-to-back-to-back!!) Three times consecutively is a MASSIVE achievement. Masters once again, although not retaining our title, largely due to the new point scoring, came a deserving 3rd overall.

Of course, much of our success is due to our coaches, volunteers (and parents) who put in the hard yards with our competitors on the beach, pool, water, boats, IRBs and lifesaving events. Pool Rescue

Silver Salties Report - 2022/2023





Silver Salties Program 2023

From a small introductory group in 2019 the Seacliff Salties have grown to a significant part of Seacliff Life Saving Club in 2023 with over 80 registered members, with significant involvement in Club activities. Our Thursday meetings have an average attendance of about 45-50 members and a peak attendance of 65 members.

The Salties Group was designed by SLSA to allow older community members and older Club members to join Surf Club activities, and for existing older members a path to remain within the Club in their later years. The Salties also allows Seacliff Life Saving Club to give back to the community allowing older persons to participate in Club activities while providing activities and gaining skills commensurate with the Saltie members age and physical capabilities.

Thursday Activities

The group activities include exercises for chair and floor, which is the most "popular" activity generally with a group of 30-35 members exercising, with notable and acknowledged improvement balance and coordination in participants. Marianne Den Dekker coordinating this activity with assistance from Laura Bosely, Cliffy, Bernard Fry, Marion Crabb and Brenda Maddern all acting as instructors at various times.





Their activities include fit ball and gym with Dennis Lorenzin providing instruction to members and Laura Boseley providing induction on the use of the gym equipment. The fit ball and gym again providing improvement in balance flexibility and strength.

Groups of up to 20 members enjoying the Seacliff environment with brisk coastal walks enjoying that fresh air.

More in line with basic Surf Club activities, Proficient members Heather Burns, Terry Keeffe, Terry Crabb, and Grunter have assisted with the introduction of improving swimming skills and aquarobics. With the warmer weather and the encouragement of the above crew we are seeing increased numbers in weekly swims from "novice" to "proficient" ocean swimmers, all conducted with the appropriate water cover and safety provisions including fluorescent coloured vests for all participants. Presently we are working on achieving parity with the requirements of SRC next summer for those members with first aid and radio courses to be considered during the winter season.




Seacliff's Silver Salties 2023 Program Achievements:

Chief Instructor's Report 2022/2023

Instruction this season at Seacliff has seen me take over the reigns as Chief Instructor.

After many years of strong leadership, and growth and development of our members, the Chief Instructor position became vacant. I was determined not to let the



Prior to the traditional beach patrols starting, our training team were busy with the next generation of IRB Drivers. The difference with this group was not only were there four Seacliff Members, but we also reached out and engaged a further four from neighbouring clubs, all under the age of 18 yrs. All capable current proficient IRB Crew members from the age of 15 yrs increased their skills, spending 30+hrs in the waters of the far south coast. Congratulations to the next generation of enthusiastic and skilled IRB drivers – an asset to our club! A logistically difficult course to run, the latest IRB drivers will be of benefit to our Patrols and water safety commitments which will far outweigh the sacrifice that is made by trainers and candidates alike. As their skills continue to grow, I can envisage our highly skilled personnel delivering water safety at National and International SLS events.





As a club, we were able to support SLSSA and our neighbours by hosting many assessments throughout the last season, most notably the State-run Bronze Medallion Award. Seacliff had no candidates of our own to present however we chose to strongly support the State-based education programs and we provided them with the use of our equipment as well as supplying water safety personnel. Thank you again, to those who supported these assessments.

This year through the support of our Vice President, Glen Patten, we have been able to update a large portion or our vital training equipment due to successful Community Grant applications. The new equipment includes adult, youth, and baby manikins. These are vital to train CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation), ART (advanced resuscitation techniques), and they are used for SRC, Skills Maintenance, Patrols scenarios and Champion Lifesaver competition training. The manikins are fitted with compatible app(s) that delivers to the trainer real-time data, such as the rate and depth of compressions, and supplies instant feedback to the candidates. We have also updated our ART kits. Two brand new units have been developed to train and deliver this award, including Oxygen delivery, and includes equipment to treat major trauma and asthma cases.



Our equipment is constantly being reviewed to ensure our gear is not only safe and hygienic but at the forefront of industry best standards, giving our members high quality equipment to assist in their training.



This season, there has been a push across the National stage for the Silver Medallion Patrol Captains award. This course was a 2-day workshop with the foundation learning taking part online, prior to the practical component. The target cohort is current Patrol Captains and Vice Captains, and potential patrol leadership. The 2-day face-to-face training was packed with vibrant practical scenarios and is designed to push you out of your comfort zone. We had several members complete this valuable training.

In addition to delivering instruction to our members, our trainers undertook an annual 2-day intensive personal development program and were offered many other opportunities throughout the season to upskill their knowledge, and in return producing better educated trainers for our teams. We have also had 2 members upgrade their skills to become ART trainers to deliver this course in-house at Seacliff.

We held a Radio skills maintenance workshop in the SOC (State Operations Centre) for Award members that wanted a better understanding of how the radio network operates. This was a skills maintenance session to better grasp the key messaging skills required for clear, and accurate delivery of radio communications. On the evening, 20 Seacliff members attended and they departed with additional skills and knowledge, to supporting their awards.



One trainer, Hayley Hosking, has successfully upskilled to become an RWC trainer with the Emergency Operations Group. Hayley has also spent a massive amount of time studying the Cert 4 in training and assessment to be recognised as an Assessor, not only for Seacliff, but for State and National life saving services and Hayley is very close to completing this certificate.





Junior Report 2022-2023

Another great season done and dusted. Normality post COVID was restored with a full schedule of three State carnivals and three full days of State championships. We also retained the Holdfast Bay Branch carnival, which restarted in 2021. This continues to offer a great chance for first time Nippers



to get a sense of what surf events are like in a more relaxed and less intimidating atmosphere.

We welcomed many new families to our Nipper community and it was great to see so many familiar faces back on the beach with this season at Seacliff, once again seeing the Seacliff program have the highest number of Nippers in all the state, 257 and we retained a 50:50 male/female ratio – a great accomplishment and one we should be really proud of. In competition this once again lead to stellar results, particularly in the youngest age groups – a great sign for the future – with Seacliff finishing third in the State Junior Championships held throughout February/ March at Semaphore, and Port Noarlunga beaches.

Season Overview

Our Nippers by the numbers

This year we continued to focus a lot on capturing data around all our activities with some amazing insights into the growth and progress of the Nipper program at Seacliff. We continued to utilise the Seacliff Nipper training app to track participation in board and swim training. Nipper participation in mid-week board training throughout the whole season also continued to grow with an average of 167 Nippers per month taking part in one or both of the board trainings. The highly successful transition program – Growing Groms – helping kids move from Under 7's to Under 8's developed by Under 7 AGL's Arran and Peta and delivered by Boards coach Anthony Doyle, continued before the season.

This AGL team also added a beach based transition program – Dash 'N Dive – with sand and sprint guru AC, that ran before the season to help kids learn about sprinting and flagging. Seventeen participated throughout September/ October, growing their confidence and skills before the season commenced. This unique transition program approach has been nominated for a State surf award this year, a great reflection of the innovation we are leading with here in the Nipper program at Seacliff.





The first Dash 'N' Drive program!

This year we had some 142 expressions of interest for Come and Try sessions, with 123 of these attending two or more sessions and ultimately 71 going on to become new members. Thanks so much to Janelle Scrivener and Kristy Klomp from the Junior Committee for managing the check in process on the beach and the amazing Terry Keefe for running the sessions. Ably assisted by Keenan Gray, and a number of other helpers through the season this program with a separate beach and water area is a real differentiator for our Club.



Nipper Saturday training saw an average of 165 nippers each week requiring a tremendous effort by all our amazing AGL's, Water Cover and parent Nipper Water Safety Certificate holders. This number continues to increase year on year and the almost constant adjustment of the space on the beach and in the surf remains a juggle. Carnival participation was also up, in part due to the transition programs in place, with around 120 kids on average attending each carnival and State Championships. This represents around 70% of our regular training Nippers going on to the competition environment.

As we continue to focus on Saturday training as the participation-based experience for all abilities of Nippers, adjustments to stations in each age group, such as creating ability level based drills, continued to have an great impact. Mid-week training remains a hybrid with more development focused training for surf and beach competitors, in events such as boards, swimming, iron and flags and limited participation only opportunities. This remains a balance we are endeavouring to strike, with the large amount of coordination and volunteers required to make it happen, which with such large numbers of Nippers, remains a challenge.

Winter Training

Winter training went from strength to strength in 2022. Thank you to Anthony and Paul for braving the cold every Tuesday and most Saturday afternoons to train our Nippers so they could keep the love of surf going even in the coldest months. This will commence in June again including the important transition for U13 nippers to Mal boards, where cross over training with the Youth and Seniors begins to prepare them for use of these boards in their final Nipper season.

Lake Bonnie pre-Season Sprint camp

The long weekend in October saw a number of returning Nipper families descend on Lake Bonnie for the annual sprint camp run by AC and Lori. In between morning and afternoon fitness and technique sessions, returning Nippers and their families were able to reconnect and hangout together and enjoy paddling (and tubing) on the quite chilly lake.

This has become the Opening of the Season event for Juniors with the weekend away a great chance for kids and families to mark the end of Winter sport and begin to turn attention to the surf season ahead.

Carnivals

The Branch Carnival, held in November, saw Seacliff join with Brighton, Somerton and Glenelg and host the first carnival of the season. This format brought Nippers together in a participation-based format to encourage friendly competition and had a really great feel on the beach early in the season.

The Branch carnival once again included events to give a chance to involve the Under 6's and Under 7's at the same time as the older Nippers – a great way to showcase the truly family nature of our movement!





January saw the first all club carnival at Somerton and the introduction of a five-pillar behaviour and results related framework for events from Surf Lifesaving SA. This was introduced to enable Clubs to more evenly compete against each other, but also to focus on Nipper, parent and volunteer behaviour to respectful ensure interactions on the beach. Training for volunteers, as well as how Clubs provide officials and water cover was also part of this approach and the Junior Committee spent a lot of time endeavouring to ensure Seacliff

Nippers were across all the new compliance elements. As a large Club this was no small feat and remains a challenge moving forward as volunteering time from our busy families becomes harder and harder to secure.

Despite this the Nippers who came along to the first carnival had an awesome time, for many their first carnival experience. With both individual and team events and three divisions providing a chance for kids of all abilities to compete equally.

The third carnival at Glenelg quickly followed in mid-February and before we knew it was time for the massive weekend away with the fourth Carnival, this time at Normanville, after Port Elliot was deemed unsafe due to the ongoing flooding. The weekend started with a full training session on Saturday at Aldinga, where the Nippers experienced some tough conditions, with wind and rain and an imposing shore break, but it was amazing to see them all head out into the water full of energy and some big smiles. A big thank-you to all the AGLs and parents that came



down to help set-up and support training, and a huge thank-you to all the water cover volunteers who got out in the waves and kept our Nippers safe.

Sunday came round fast, conditions were much calmer further down the coast and there were some nerves, but Seacliff Nippers all stepped up and all the kids did an amazing job.

Thank you to all the volunteers, with so many parents having a job somewhere on the beach, as a big Club we always have a lot of places to fill and your help is invaluable. Thank you to the Junior committee for all the behind-the-scenes work done prior to the carnivals to make them seem so easy.

State Titles - Semaphore and Port Noarlunga

After State Championships last season was stretched over 5 weekends, changes this year saw the State Titles consolidate to only two weekends easing the logistical strain of many of our families! This did create some scheduling challenges with RnR and March Past in particular and some very early starts for competitors but there were nevertheless some great results.

The RnR coaches worked particularly hard against this year, building on the previous



seasons results and Nippers across all age groups did exceptionally well in the very early start (and small beach!) at Semaphore. This was complicated by semi finals and finals being wedged in between other events on the beach, creating a little bit of stress for kids and coaches during the day, but there was very little complaining from the crew. And results showed, with Gold and Bronze in the two person and Gold and Silver in the 5 person events.

A very special call out to Georgia Parkin who, as conditions deteriorated over the afternoon at Semaphore, had a close encounter with an IRB just as the Under 11's final event for the day was called off. This was a great reminder of how quickly the surf conditions can turn and how important the skills our nippers develop are for managing in the ocean.





The final two days of State Champs the action moved to Port Noarlunga with the first day individual beach and water activity, and the second day focused on team events. It was inspiring to see how well all the children performed. While there are just too many fantastic results to talk about here, here a few highlights:

- The boys all age relay team made the final with a blistering heat and were neck and neck in the final with some amazing running, winning the Gold, edging out Brighton and Henley for 2nd and 3rd respectively. The cheering from the crowd and the look on the kids faces when the last runner crossed the line was unforgettable. The girls all age relay also continued great results of previous years finishing third behind rivals Grange and Brighton.
- Samuel Richards in Under 9's pulled out some amazing performances managing a top 6 in every single individual event bar one.
- In the Under 8's first state carnival the Cameron relay team pulled together a huge effort to pick up the gold medal and Henley, Lewis, Morgan and Sonny had one of the best celebrations on the beach.

 Zane Rooney in his last year in Under 13's after some great performances on the beach brought home Gold in Champion Lifesaver, following up his State Nipper of the Year nomination.





On both weekends walking around the beach you could see black caps everywhere cheering on their teammates. This is something we are great at here at Seacliff – while results and medals are great, it doesn't matter where anyone comes, they are always cheered over the line by their teammates. This was no more apparent than in March Past where once again Seacliff regularly had two high quality teams starting off the carnival days. Coached by Shauna on Saturdays this is always a spectacular showcase of the Nippers and a wonderful reflection of the sports history at the same time.









After the month of State champs, Nipper and parents exhausted we said goodbye to the season with a wonderful third place in the State.

Our patrol teams diligently recorded 63 preventative actions, two rescues, and 23 first aid responses. For three of these incidents, our teams worked with the SA Ambulance Service, demonstrating their exceptional teamwork and coordination during an emergency. Our patrol members skilfully responded to a number of incidents involving major injuries, marine creatures, and search and rescue operations.

I would like to recognise the extraordinary efforts of two of our patrol members, Tony Scrivener and Derek Bawden, who this season have demonstrated exceptional skills



and courage in responding to major rescues. Both of these incidents were handled with professionalism and outstanding lifesaving skills which speaks volumes to their competence as exceptional patrol members. These incidents serve as a powerful reminder of the importance of our Surf Lifesaving clubs and the impact, we as lifesavers have in safeguarding members of the community.



One of the highlights of the patrol season was the successful organisation of our inaugural Rainbow Beach Day, a vibrant celebration that coincided with World Pride this year in

This event February. aimed to honour the diversity of the Seacliff SLSC and the broader community as well as create an inclusive and welcoming atmosphere for all members of the LGBTQIA+ community and their allies. Rainbow Beach Day was great symbol acceptance, diversity, and unity of the Seacliff



SLSC community. This season we also introduced two Pride rescue boards to our asset list. These boards can be seen on patrol each weekend, further showcasing that our Club is a welcoming and accepting environment.

Additionally, in line with the Seacliff's commitment to equality and recognising the invaluable contributions of women in Surf Lifesaving, we proudly continued our tradition of the annual Pink Patrol. This initiative highlights and celebrates the achievements of women within our club and the broader Surf Lifesaving movement.

This season Seacliff SLSC has taken action to install an automated external defibrillator outside of the Surf Club. This life-saving device is accessible to the public 24/7 thus significantly enhancing the safety and well-being of all beachgoers, residents, and visitors to our area. A second publicly accessible defibrillator is set to be installed at the Seacliff Patrol Tower during the off season. I would like to thank Louise Miller-Frost and the Seacliff Beach Hotel Social Club for their invaluable support and providing funds for this initiative. Their commitment to the well-being of our community has enabled us to create a safer and more secure environment for everyone who visits our beach. Thank you also to our Vice President Glen Patten for his work in securing the funds for this vital project.

This season has seen 65 of our members recognised with National Patrol Service Awards, honouring their significant contributions to lifesaving. Another five members have surpassed career patrol hour milestones this season. Their dedication to the Seacliff Surf Club has made a lasting impact on our Community, and we are grateful for your commitment.

National Medals

The National Medal was established by the Commonwealth of Australia in 1975 as one of the original elements of the distinctive Australian system of honours and awards. Initially created as a military recognition award, the National Medal has since branched out into government and voluntary organisations and is now Australia's most awarded civil medal. The National Medal is awarded to individuals on behalf of the Governor-General of Australia, His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd) and recognises long and diligent service in organisations that are dedicated to protecting life and property at a degree of risk to their members. The National Medal is available to Surf Life Saving Australia volunteers who are eligible and proficient with a minimum of 30 patrol hours each season, who have completed a minimum period of 15 full seasons. This year three Seacliff SLSC members were honoured with National Medals.




COMMUNICATION IS THE KEY

IRB Report - 2022/2023

During the past season the IRB drivers and crews have supported both our ability to patrol, and our Nippers during Saturday training with a full complement of resources and assets. The use of these assets is essential for the successful running of the Nipper Program water activities and to provide essential community safety services, in addition to our great array



of quiet achievers that don't seek awards or recognition but are there week in week out on Patrol, JWC and events in every capacity.

Throughout the season there have been several combined rescues that involved SAPOL and our SLSSA co-ordinators with Seacliff on the water to assist as needed, demonstrating the key role each Club plays in being rescue ready.

With our new Hulls comes additional maintenance and hands required to not just maintain but prepare our assets for the many events we support over the season which is typically when we dust off 'the general' once more. This is no mean feat, it takes time and effort to strip and clean the IRBs on a regular basis for storage then to set up for events such as Kozii, Atlantic swim, Brighton Jetty Swim, Jnr and Open/Masters Carnivals to name a few, but also our Club Swims where we have increased our IRB cover, particularly early on in the season.

There have been a few stand outs this season, there's always dedication from the old boys but some young blood is coming through, in particular Arran McMillan has continued to support the IRBs in maintenance and always on hand to help, as well as Mary Ellis who was involved in heavy swells for the first time during a rescue and managed herself as crew with great professionalism. Also there was a very much appreciated volunteer who stepped in to tidy the IRB motor room after it got a little bit messy mid-season, Warren Symonds.



It makes a huge difference when there are many volunteers

to help with the ongoing preparation and maintenance activities. I would encourage more to come along so when you're a driver or crew you've got that little bit of extra knowledge that could help get the motor started or get it running again, which in turn could help save a life. Next season we will target some motor training to help our crews and drivers with this so keep an eye out for the notifications through the Club.

As we know some of our crews and drivers compete in IRB racing during the off season to keep the hulls warm! It's been a great season so far, again with some young blood coming through in the form of Dylan & Fin Taylor along with Jack Bawden creating a super quick male team, absolutely

smashing it in U23s but right in the mix with the Open Mens! Georgia Warriner has been mixing it up in Opens and U23 again and getting great results for her drivers! The future's looking bright and we look forward to more joining the team in the coming season. Although this is a sport, this is an amazing way for our drivers and crews to hone their skills in all conditions with live patients in a controlled manner — I know I'd rather have one of these guys heading towards at high speed in rough conditions than anyone else!

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Financial Reporting Framework

The Committee have prepared the financial statements on the basis that the association is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. These financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the Associations Incorporation Act 1985 . The association is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012, the Associations Incorporation Act 1985, and the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with those of previous period unless stated otherwise.

Statement of Compliance

Seacliff Surf Life Saving Club Inc, a not-for-profit entity, has prepared special purpose financial statements as, in the opinion of the Committee, it is unlikely there are users of these financial statements who are not in a position to require the preparation of reports tailored to their information needs. Accordingly, these financial statements have been prepared to satisfy the Committee's reporting requirements under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Club has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ("AASB") and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 "Presentation of Financial Statements", AASB 107 "Statement of Cash Flows", AASB 108 "Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors", AASB 1048 "Interpretation of Standards" and AASB 1054 "Australian Additional Disclosures", as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2023

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT)

(b) Financial Instruments

Recognition and Initial Measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the club commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately.

Loans and Receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

Financial liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities other than financial guarantees are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial liability is derecognised.

Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Committee reviews the carrying values of the Association's assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

(c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments.

(d) Revenue

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2023

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT)

(d) Revenue (Cont)

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the incorporated association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the incorporated association is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point in time when the customer obtains control of the goods, which is generally at the time of delivery.

Sales revenue

Events, fundraising and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received. Where conditions are attached to the donation which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the donation, the recognition of the donation as revenue will be deferred until these conditions are satisfied.

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(e) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

(f) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and current replacement cost.

Inventories acquired at no cost, or for nominal consideration, are valued at the current replacement cost as at the date of acquisition.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2023

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT)

(g) Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and any impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than the recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present (refer to Note 1(B) for details of impairment).

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, are recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2023

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT)

(h) Right-of-Use Assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the association expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The association has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

(i) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(i) Employee Provisions

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on corporate bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

(k) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(I) Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Where the association retrospectively applies an accounting policy, makes a retrospective restatement or reclassifies items in its financial statements, a third statement of financial position as at the beginning of the preceeding period in addition to the minimum comparative financial statements must be presented.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2023

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT)

(m) Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amount normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(n) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

(o) Impairment of non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

(p) Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

(q) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the association for the annual reporting period ended 30 April 2023. The initial assessment of the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations is that there will not be a material impact on the Association.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2023

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT)

(r) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The committee evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the association.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The Club determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability and inflation have been taken into account.

Qualified Opinion

We are therefore unable to express an opinion on whether the recorded trading revenue is complete.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of our report. We are independent of the Club in accordance with the auditor independence requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012* the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.
